


# Background & Guidelines

## **Social Media Shorts Competition**

- 1. Introduce Helen Liu Fong in a 30-second Instagram reel—explore her fascinating life story or discover her impactful work. Exploring Helen's existing projects in person and sharing your on-site experience are highly encouraged.
- 2. In the field of architecture, information gathering, case studying, and physically experiencing the space are essential. This competition challenges you to utilize Instagram reel to amplify the experience and narrative.
- 3. Submission is limited to 1 video and 1 thumbnail image for each participant. The video should be in 9:16 format, with a maximum length of 30 seconds and a maximum file size of 100MB, and the thumbnail image should be in square format, with maximum file size of 2MB.
- 4. The music used in the video should only be copyrighted music.
- 5. Please follow the following Instagram account for any competition information.



## **Model Making Competition**

- 1. Use only 3-5 kinds of everyday items, such as objects, fruits, veggies, etc., to create your own Googie architecture. Capture your model in five photos, ranging from overall views to detailed close-ups.
- 2. Googie architecture is all about shapes, curves, repetition, bold colors, and more. By finding and transforming physical objects, it's a challenge to communicate your narrative of Googie-style structures visually.
- 3. You can only select 3-5 types of existing items, and there are no limitations on the quantity of each kind. By dismantling, repeating, or simply reorganizing the chosen items, you can tell the story of your Googie architecture. And remember, the devil is in the details.
- 4. Submissions are required to be 5 photos. Images should be in .jpg, .png, .tif, or .pdf format and restricted to 1080x1080 resolution,
- 5. with a maximum file size of 10MB in total of 5 photos combined.

- Submissions that fail to follow the above instructions will be automatically disqualified.

## WHO IS HELEN LIU FONG?

Helen Liu Fong was a trailblazing Chinese American designer. Driven by a passion for architecture since childhood, Fong left a lasting impact on her field through her Googiestyle buildings, including iconic diners, coffee shops, hotels, and gas stations.

Born in Chinatown, Los Angeles, in 1927 to Chinese immigrant parents, Helen began her design education at the University of California, Los Angeles, and later transferred to the University of California, Berkeley, where she earned a degree in city planning from the School of Architecture in 1949. After completing her education, she returned to Los Angeles, where she first started working with architect Eugene Choy and soon after joined the architectural firm Armet and Davis.

In her collaboration with Armet and Davis, Helen was pivotal in pioneering Googie-style designs. She helped make vibrant colors, upswept roofs, boomerang angles, and attention-grabbing neon beacons emblems of the mid-century era. Fong's iconic designs include Pann's Coffee Shop near Westchester and LAX, the first Norms Restaurant on Figueroa Street, Johnie's Coffee Shop at Wilshire Boulevard and Fairfax Avenue, and the Holiday Bowl on Crenshaw Boulevard showcased her ability to blend efficiency with spectacle.
